## MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR / CEO

I welcome you all to the 2020 annual general meeting of the Saskatchewan Golf Association Inc. operating as Golf Saskatchewan.

On any previous year since 2010, my report to the membership would have contained updates on what the golf year might look like including; the launch of the World Handicap System (WHS), handicap certification seminars, opening an active golf season on April 15, course visitation schedule, championship events, order of merit tour schedules, course rating, participation programs like golf in school, Rules of Golf workshops, and many other services.

- **Coaching & Instruction:** we continue to invest in the development of our coaching initiatives with Steve Ryde, Jason Schneider, or other PGA of Saskatchewan coaches across the province. Whether it is a young player or a veteran player wanting to improve, we assist in fostering a relationship with all experts, to make the game more enjoyable for everyone.

Golf Saskatchewan continues to focus on the four main areas of our Strategic Plan and the foundational measurements; 1. Ensuring Excellence, 2. Growing Participation, 3. Fostering Interaction and 4. Expanding Capacity. ### **Golf Course Visitation Program**

Golf course visitations have always been a great way to build and maintain relationships with our member clubs. In 2019, we had 60 specific course visitations to finish up our goal of visiting all member clubs in two years. In 2018, we visited 63 member clubs and 35 in 2017.

In 2020, prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, we were focused on continuing golf course visitations, with a combination of visiting member and non-member clubs. When it is safe to continue with club visitations this season, we will contact clubs on our visitation schedule 2 weeks prior to the visit to ensure we are able to meet with the appropriate contacts for the course.

### **Membership Assistance Program (MAP Grants)**

The purpose of the Membership Assistance Program (MAP) grant is to provide financial assistance to Golf Saskatchewan registered affiliated clubs so they may operate programs encouraging and promoting community and club level sport development in their local area. Development of these programs and services will increase membership in Golf Saskatchewan and the local member organizations. MAP is funded by the Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture & Recreation and is derived from the sale of lottery tickets in Saskatchewan.

In 2019, Golf Saskatchewan distributed \$98,200 in MAP Grants to 91 member clubs. A complete break-down of the clubs and the MAP funding from 2019 can be found in the Audited Financial Statements (Schedule 7) of the audited financial statements.

In 2020, \$100,000 will be distributed to Member Clubs. Since we began tracking the distributed MAP GRANTS funds in 2001, approximately \$1.53

million has been allotted to member clubs. Thank you for the continued support in growing member participation in golf and remember to purchase your lottery tickets.



#### Hole-in-One Club

Golf Saskatchewan has tracked holes-in-one by members in the Hole-in-One Club since 2004. Any member scoring a hole-in-one receives a pin and certificate from Golf Saskatchewan upon submission of their information and they are also recognized in our ON PAR E-Newsletter.

## **Golf Canada - Incident Protection Program**





In 2019, 20 Golf Saskatchewan members submit claims under the Incident Protection Program (IPP) valued at \$11,262 in damages, theft or loss. This was slightly behind the 17 incidents in 2018 resulting in \$11,310 claims being reimbursed. The items included a combination of equipment damage, loss or theft, broken glass, golf cart damage or the program paying the deductible on a member's home insurance for items above the valued threshold.

In 2020, we will continue to update our membership about the incident protection program.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE

I am pleased to present the financial report for 2019 for the year ending Dec 31st, 2019. The firm of VIRTUS GROUP has completed the annual audit of the financial statements of Golf Saskatchewan. In VIRTUS Group's opinion, management maintains an appropriate system of internal accounting controls ensure the transactions are accurately recorded on a timely basis, are properly approved and result in reliable financial statements. Management and the Board of Directors acknowledge the financial statements are their responsibility.



The Finance Committee, composed of members of the Board of Directors, meets with the management of Golf

Saskatchewan to ensure accuracy of the association's financial reports. The Board of Directors has voted to approve the financial statements as presented in the Appendix I of the annual report. Financial highlights:

- i. *Revenues* increased just over 6% or \$53,348 from the previous year.
  - The revenue increases were in the membership area, annual grants and championship revenues compared to the previous year.
- ii. *Expenses* were comparable to the previous year with a small increase of less than 1% or \$1,000 from the previous year.
  - o Increase in the areas of Administration, Participation & Interaction, and the Excellence.

The Expenses are detailed below:

- iii. *Administration (Schedule 3)* increase approximately 5% or \$19,000.
  - o Amortization of assets and investment in personnel providing more services.
- iv. *Capacity and Interaction (Schedule 4)* decreased approximately 47% or \$35,000.
  - o The decrease was largely captured in not having a CP Women's Open 50/50 winner.
- v. *Participation and Interaction (Schedule 5)* decreased approximately 7% or \$7,700.
  - o 2019 we had some savings in our Officials development.
- vi. *Excellence (Schedule 6)* increase approximately 28% or \$17,000.
  - o Increase in spending on national championships and athlete assistance compared to 2018. We also had a couple of multi-sport game events in 2019 which we did not have in 2018.

The overall result is a **\$2,401 deficiency** of revenues over expenses and therefore a decrease in the reserves (unrestricted net assets).

#### **NOTES TO BUDGETING:**

- 1. For the budgeting process, the board and management do not include any grant revenues unless they have officially been announced and received by the office.
- 2. For the 2019 Fiscal Year, the Board of Directors approved a strategic deficit budget of \$32,100 (with forecasted expenses totaling \$960,450 compared to revenues of \$928,350).
  - a. Actual Revenues = \$927,215 and Actual Expenses = \$929,616.
- 3. Reminder to membership: an approved deficit budget does not impact Golf Saskatchewan's overall financial position due to our strong reserve funds, and limited interest was accounted in our general operating funds. One of our strategic measures is a zero budget in less than three years.

Thank you to the Golf Saskatchewan staff, Board of Directors and the Finance Committee for their contributions during the past year.

#### HANDICAP COMMITTEE

## Purpose of the Golf Canada Handicap System









The purpose of the World Handicap System (WHS) is to make the game of golf more enjoyable for golfers by providing a consistent means of measuring one's performance and progress and to enable golfers of differing abilities to compete, or play a casual round, with anyone else on a fair and equal basis.

Through the WHS, each golfer establishes a "Handicap Index" which is the measure of a player's demonstrated ability on a course of standard playing difficulty.

The Handicap Index is calculated using the lowest eight of the player's most recent 20 Score Differentials and updated with each new round played. The Handicap Index travels worldwide with the golfer from course to course (and tee to tee) and is used to calculate a "Course Handicap". The Course Handicap is the number of strokes a golfer receives from the specific set of tees at the course. The more difficult the golf course, the more strokes the golfer receives and vice versa.

The relative difficulty of a golf course is determined jointly by Golf Canada and the provincial golf association using the WHS Course Rating System as administered by Golf Canada. Specially trained Course Rating Teams evaluate the difficulty of a golf course based on such variables as length and several obstacle factors (e.g. topography, bunkers, lateral & crossing obstacles, severity of rough, etc.).

Only Golf Canada member golf clubs are permitted to use the World Handicap System and Course Rating System (as administered by Golf Canada) including related trademarks and service marks. Member golf clubs must do so

in a manner that preserves the integrity and reliability of these systems. All rights to use these systems and related trademarks and service marks terminate should the golf club cease to be a member in good standing with Golf Canada.

#### **Golf Canada Score Centre**

Post your golf scores, look up a golfers' handicap factor(s), find golf courses in Canada, compute your course handicap and more. If you haven't downloaded the app for your iPhone or Android device, do so in 2020. You could get rewarded just for posting a score. Let's increase the posted rounds in 2019.

The handicap season for posting scores at Saskatchewan golf courses is April 15 to Oct. 31. All games played outside the active handicap season in Saskatchewan should not be posted for your handicap.

#### EXCELLENCE - HIGH PERFORMANCE DEVELOPMENT TEAM

The High-Performance Development Team is a strategic measure under the excellence area of Golf Saskatchewan's strategic plan. The overall goal of the HPD Team is to perform better on the golf course, at tournaments, be focused on the tasks at hand on and off the course and develop all aspects of their golf games. In 2019 we had five athletes take part in the HP training program. These players were introduced to a personalized fitness training program at Club 1621, mental training sessions, dieticians, and golf coaching and instruction from Steve Ryde and Jason Schneider.

In 2019, the Easter Golf Camp took place at Crowne Isle Resort, in Comox BC. Junior golfers from across Saskatchewan were invited to get a head start on their golf season and be a part of the week-long trip to the island. Six players attended as well as two coaches and a female chaperone. It was a wonderful week of learning, skill building, and competition for the juniors that took part.

The 2020 Easter Golf Camp was scheduled to visit Golf Canada's training center at Bear Mountain resort in Victoria during the Easter Break. With a lack of participant interest, the Sport Committee has decided to cancel the golf camp for 2020. It will be revisited in 2020/2021.

## **Coaching Development**

The PGA of Canada's coaching program is developed in partnership with Golf Canada and the Coaching Association of Canada (CAC). The PGA of Canada is one of 67 sports participating in the National Coaching Certification Program (NCCP), representing coaching and instructing excellence in Canada. Golf Saskatchewan has made Coaching a strategic imperative. We have Steve Ryde and Jason Schneider (CDC) to be the coaching leaders for our province and work with our High-Performance Development team and our Integrated Support Team. As of 2020 Saskatchewan has:

- 2 Certified CNC Coaches, 2 in training
- 2 Certified CDC

- 16 Certified, 34 trained in Instructor of Beginner Golfers
- 12 Certified, 34 in Instructor of Intermediate Golfers

## **Community Golf Coach**

This workshop has been designed for the Community Golf Coach who is, or would like to, work with children or youth and is introducing the basic skills of golf. The overall goal of this workshop is to help prepare the coach to be competent in the skills required by a community coach. In 2019, the Community Golf Coach seminar was scheduled for April, at the Willows GCC but was cancelled due to lack of participants. The plans for 2020 have been put on hold for now due to COVID-19. Any updates for the Community Coaching stream will be communicated on our website and social media channels.

## National Athlete Assistance Subsidy (NAAS)

The Sport Development Committee believes in our athletes competing and excelling at the highest levels. In 2013, the National Athlete Assistance Subsidy program was revamped from an application process to an earned program. Following our provincial championships, athletes who qualify to attend nationals, either on teams/quota spots, are eligible to receive funding. The amount of subsidy is determined on an annual basis, however more dollars are allocated towards players who make the team spots. In 2019, NAAS combined with the national championship funding and more than \$48,000 was invested into assisting our players compete at Golf Canada championships.

#### **SAGE Scholarships**

The program annually presents scholarships to assist deserving member golfers in their pursuit of high school and post-secondary academic excellence. The successful recipients are selected on their basis of academic excellence as well as some weighting of their golf participation.

The two organizations who pay the scholarship amounts are Golf Saskatchewan and the Saskatoon Community Foundation. In 2019, more than \$12,700 was awarded to 13 student athletes, provided they attended university, college, trade-school or post-secondary institution.

## Saskatchewan First Nations Summer Games (Tony Cote Games)





#### **National Golf in Schools:**







This program has been developed for teachers to provide students the opportunity to develop aspects of "physical literacy" related to the sport of golf. The program also increases student knowledge and appreciation for the sport of golf.

In 2019, we introduced the Future Links Golf in Schools program to three elementary schools, one intermediate, and one high school into the program. Golf Saskatchewan's commitment to growing the sport is evident through this program. It would not be possible for Golf in Schools to have the success it has had without the school boards, schools, communities and member club's support. At the end of 2019, Golf in Schools reached 281 elementary schools, 16 intermediate schools and 52 high schools = **Total of 349**.

The focus in 2019 and beyond is to contact as many of the GIS sites in Saskatchewan as possible to see how the program is working with their school, and if they would like a PGA of Saskatchewan professional or community coach to help with operating golf clinics.

**How can we get a GIS kit?** Some of the schools contacted our office or Golf Canada and purchased kits, others were chosen to receive a kit based on school budget shortfalls and some schools have been adopted by a club, golf professional, or local golfer.

#### The Solo-Rider

Sometimes people cannot play golf due to mobility issues related to age, change in life situation, health deterioration or an accident. The Solo-Rider is turning what used to be thought of as impossibility, into a reality. Athletes who have a mobility issue can now enjoy the stable, comfortable, and fun way to get back in the game.

The specialty cart enables golfers to continue to enjoy the game of golf or take it up for the first time. Golf Saskatchewan, through funding from Sask Sport Inc. and the Para-Sport grant now owns two Solo-Ride power-carts. The Solo-Riders are in Saskatoon, at the Silverwood Golf Course and in Regina, at the Royal Regina Golf Club.

There is no cost to rent the Solo-Rider other than the cost of a green fee.

Golf Saskatchewan is currently working with shareholders to purchase a Solo-Rider for the Prince Albert area most likely Cooke Municipal Golf Course. In 2019 our organization was ecstatic to allow a player to participate in a tournament used to raise funds for <u>spinal cord injury programming</u>. Please assist us in spreading the word about the Solo-Rider as an option for enjoying the game. Golf, a game for everyone.



#### Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of **Saskatchewan Golf Association Inc.** operating as **Golf Saskatchewan** which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2019, and the statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

#### 1. Description of operations

Saskatchewan Golf Association Inc. ("Golf Saskatchewan" or the "Association") was incorporated under the *Non-profit Corporations Act*, 1995 of Saskatchewan. The Association promotes and coordinates amateur golf in the province of Saskatchewan. The Association is exempt from income taxes under Section 149(1)(I) of the *Income Tax Act*.

#### 2. Summary of significant accounting policies

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. The financial statements required management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenses during the period. These estimates are reviewed periodically, and, as adjustments become necessary, they are reported in earnings in the period in which they become known. The financial statements reflect the following policies:

#### Financial instruments - recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recorded on the statement of financial position when the Association becomes party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument. All financial instruments are required to be recognized at fair value upon initial recognition, except for certain related party transactions. All other financial assets, except for investments, and financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortized cost adjusted by transaction costs, which are amortized over the expected life of the instrument. Investments are measured at fair value.

Fair value is the amount at which a financial instrument could be exchanged at arm's length between willing, unrelated parties in an open market. Changes in fair values of financial assets and financial liabilities measured at fair value are recognized in excess of revenues over expenses.

When there is an indication of impairment and such impairment is determined to have occurred, the carrying amount of financial assets measured at amortized cost is reduced to the greater of the discounted cash flows expected or the proceeds that could be realized from sale of the financial asset. Such impairments can be subsequently reversed if the value subsequently improves.

#### Inventory

Inventory is recorded at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Cost is determined based on the specific identification method.

#### Tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost less accumulated amortization. Amortization is provided on a declining balance basis over the estimated useful life of the assets at the following annual rates:

Computers 40% Equipment 30% Furniture & fixtures 30%

#### 2. Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

#### **Funds**

The Golf Hall of Fame fund is an internally restricted fund established to hold funds raised in support of a Saskatchewan golf hall of fame.

#### Revenue recognition

The Organization follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable, if the amount can be reasonably estimated and collections are assured. Revenues received from the Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation are recorded as revenue in year to which the funding relates. Investment revenue is recognized as it is earned.

#### **Donations in kind**

Donations of material and services are recorded at fair market value when received if the amount can be reasonably estimated and would otherwise have been purchased.

#### Contributed services

The work of Golf Saskatchewan is dependent on the services of many volunteers at amateur events as well as for the governance council and various committees. Since these services are not normally purchased and because of the difficulty in determining their fair value, donated services are not recorded in the statement of operations.

The RBC A+ Unified Managed Account is a structure which provides access to multiple investment managers within one account. The asset allocation of the account at year end was 48% equities and 48% fixed income (2018 – 45% equities and 55% fixed income), with an emphasis on high quality securities, income generation, downside protection and capital preservation.

At December 31, 2019, the asset allocation in the account was \$14,082 in cash, \$226,212 in fixed income and \$226,123 in equities. At December 31, 2018, the asset allocation in the account was \$15,929 in cash, \$220,479 in fixed income and \$166,940 in equities.

#### 5. Sport Legacy Fund

The cash surrender value of the life insurance policy and investment in the Sport Legacy Fund consists of donations based on various programs and contributions by Sask Sport. These amounts are recorded as deferred revenue until amounts have been received. To qualify for an additional contribution by Sask Sport Inc., the Association is required to leave the original amount and any additional donations in the Legacy Fund for a minimum of five years.

#### 6. Deferred revenue

During 2019, the Association received \$224,200 (2018 – \$206,150) from the Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for annual expenses which will occur in the following fiscal year. Deferred revenue includes the funds invested with the Sport Legacy Fund of \$9,318 (2018 – \$8,788) and unspent Indigenous Sport Enhancement grant funds of \$5,856 (2018 - \$0).

#### 7. Economic dependence

Golf Saskatchewan currently receives revenue in grants from Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation. As a result, the Association is dependent upon the continuance of these grants to maintain operations at their current level.

#### 8. Financial instruments

The Association recognized financial instruments consist of cash, accounts receivable, accounts payable, accrued liabilities and investments. The fair value of cash, accounts receivable, accounts payable, accrued liabilities and investments approximate their carrying value given the short-term nature of the amounts.

#### 9. Financial risk management

The significant financial risks to which the Association is exposed are:

#### Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will cause a financial loss for the other party by failing to discharge an obligation. The Association is exposed to credit risk on the accounts receivable from its customers, however, does not have a significant exposure to any individual customer or member. The Association incurred \$2,147 (2018 - \$3,845) in bad debt expense in the current year. The Association's customers are mainly members of the Association.

#### Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that an entity will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The Association's exposure to liquidity risk is dependent on the receipt of funds from its operations and other related sources. Funds from these sources are primarily used to finance working capital and capital expenditure requirements and are considered adequate to meet the Association's financial obligations.

#### Price risk

Price risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. The Associations investments in publically traded securities expose the Association to market price risk as such investments are subject to price changes in the open market. The Association does not use any derivative financial instruments to alter the effects of this risk.

#### 10. Contributed materials

During the year the Association received donated golf products estimated to be valued at \$20,000.

#### 11. Subsequent event

On March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared a global pandemic for the COVID-19 virus. The Association is following health advisories and mandatory requirements from local, provincial and national health and government organizations. The financial impact on the Association, and its ability to continue operations once the pandemic ends, is unknown.

The Association has investment holdings in equities and worldwide financial markets have significantly declined since the pandemic was declared. As of March 27, 2020, the Association's RBC A+ Unified Managed Account (Note 4) had a current fair market value of \$428,330, a decline of \$38,087 or 8.17% since year end. This decline has not been recognized in the financial statements as management believes that the value of the investment portfolio will recover when the pandemic is over. Financial markets continue to fluctuate daily based on current events. It is unknown whether the Association will experience a financial loss on its investments, and if so, how much.
