Brad Phelps

After competing in baseball, fastball and slow-pitch, Brad Phelps was encouraged to try golf at age 35 by Brad Vinnick, Assistant Pro at Holiday Park in Saskatoon. In the subsequent twenty years he has accomplished the extraordinary achievement of competing at national events twelve times.

Brad won the Saskatchewan Mid-Amateur Championship in 2008 and 2017. At the Canadian championship he won the bronze medal in 2015 and the silver medal in 2017. He has represented the province on six



Mid-Amateur teams. With teammates Tyler Wright and Jim Born in 2017, they tied for first at the Canadian competition, but were awarded second place after a playoff. Brad has been the Saskatchewan Mid-Master Champion six times between 2008–2017. He has been the Saskatchewan Order of Merit winner from 2009 to 2011. This year he began competing in Seniors.

Brad has competed in other prestigious events at the national level: the Canadian Amateur when it was held at Niakwa Golf Club in Manitoba, and twice when the Canadian Tour was held at Dakota Dunes. He has won many tournaments around the province, such as the Lobstick, Central Amateur, Publinx, P.A. Northern, Holiday Park Open and Wildwood Open. He teamed with Colin Coben to win the 2019 Saskatchewan Amateur Team Championship.

Brad was born in Saskatoon and lives here with his partner. His job as the Night Supervisor of city operations finishes in time for him to hit the Holiday Park Golf Course every morning. Playing 130 rounds a year is remarkable for this climate.

Brad has an excellent understanding of the rules of golf and upholds them with honesty and integrity. Brad's camaraderie and compliments to players while competing has resulted in good friendships wherever he played. He has built quality relationships with people involved in golf across Canada and has been a tremendous ambassador for Saskatchewan. Golf has enabled him to satisfy his love of travel across the country (but he still must get to Newfoundland).

Brad has played outstanding golf while exemplifying good sportsmanship and respect for the game. He is being inducted into the Saskatchewan Golf Hall of Fame as an amateur player.
