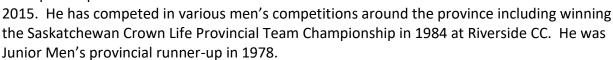
DR. RANDY GILEWICH

Dr. Randy Gilewich has an outstanding record as an amateur golfer in Saskatchewan over forty years. He has played in seven Canadian Amateur championships. On four of those occasions he was a member of the Saskatchewan Willingdon Cup team: 1992, '93, '94 and '96, twice reaching the round of thirty-two in match play.

He was a member of the Saskatchewan Junior team in 1979 and participated in five national Mid-Amateur events between 2002 and 2017. Adding in the Canadian Club Champions' Championship in Nova Scotia in 1996 and the Canadian Crown Life Championship in Quebec in 1984, he has competed at the national level in most provinces. Randy is highly regarded by his fellow competitors.

At the provincial level, Randy won the Mixed Golf Championship with Kim Walker in 2014 and



Randy started as a junior golfer at Wascana Country Club in 1974 and has been a member continuously since then. He holds four men's club championships and has had holes-in-one on Wascana's third and eleventh holes.

Randy has been involved in growing the game of golf in Saskatchewan in many ways. He revitalized the Regina Men's City Amateur after a ten-year hiatus, created the Saskatchewan Southern Senior Men's Amateur in 2019, and has supported the Diamond in the Rough junior development camp at Deer Valley. He has been an enthusiastic sponsor of golf events in Regina – recent examples are the Canadian Ladies' Amateur and the Canadian Mid-Amateur Men's as well as the Regina City Ladies' tournament. Over the years he has been a strong supporter of Golf Saskatchewan.

Dr. Randy Gilewich graduated from the University of Saskatchewan with distinction in 1985 and is a well-respected dentist practicing in Regina. He has two children, Megan and Ryan.

Randy has also excelled in curling, skipping a team in many playdowns. He was on the winning 2004 Saskatchewan Mixed curling team.
